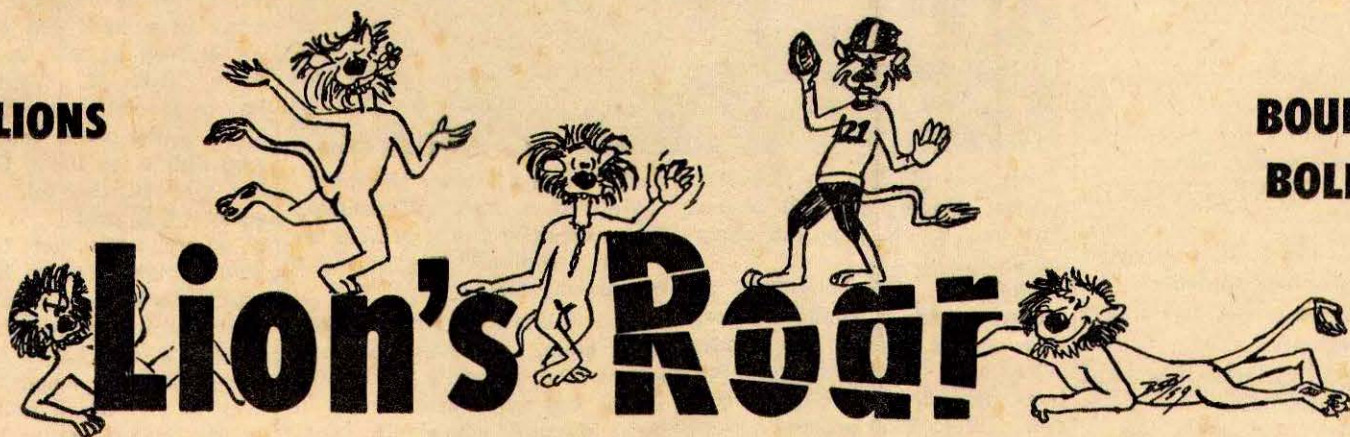

**Phyllis Chamison**, a senior, Consul of local and district JCL, a member of the Historical Society, National Honor Society, AFS, Senior Girls' Club.

**Jimmy Slater**, senior, a member of the varsity football, baseball, and basketball team, Key Club, JCL, National Honor Society.

**Dale Duke**, junior, 1st vice president of Paramedical Club, a member of G.A.A., tennis team, Student Council, and Junior Girls' Club.

**Allen Greene**, junior, a member of the YMCA and Cotillion. **WHAT EFFECT, IF ANY, WILL IT HAVE ON YOU IN APPLYING FOR COLLEGE IF LANDON IS NOT ACCREDITED?**

**Phyllis:** It probably will not effect me because my application will be turned in before the school is accredited or not. However, if the college checks back later on in the year and Landon is not accredited, then they might not accept me.

**Jimmy:** It won't affect me that much as I am applying for college soon.

**Dale:** Today it is hard to get into a good college. The out-of-state colleges choose their students in the order of:

1. students who live in the state the college is in.
2. students from out-of-state accredited high schools.
3. students from unaccredited high schools.

In other words, the student from an unaccredited high school is considered as a last resort by colleges.

**Allen:** It would be very difficult to get into a decent college. The only one that I could go to would be a low grade college.

## IS YOUR FAMILY CONCERNED THAT LANDON MAY NOT BE ACCREDITED?

**Phyllis:** My mother, who is a teacher, is especially concerned over this problem for me, her students, and all other students.

**Jimmy:** My family is not too worried because they feel that I will already be in college when and if that occurs.

**Dale:** Yes, as my older sister is in college they know how hard it is to get into college even from an accredited school.

**Allen:** (Quite a bit.)

## Q. WHAT CAN BE DONE TO PREVENT LANDON FROM BEING UNACCREDITED?

**Phyllis:** Property could be reapportioned so that more taxes would be paid. Also, the county budget could allot more.

**Jimmy:** The school can be given more teachers & better facilities. The size of the classrooms could be cut down.

**Dale:** The people could stop being so smug and having the "it won't happen here" attitude. They must realize that we are the future. If we don't get a good education our future won't be up to par.

**Allen:** The Science department and others should be allotted more money for the necessary supplies for adequate teaching.

## Q. WHOSE FAULT DO YOU THINK IT IS THAT LANDON MAY NOT BE ACCREDITED?

**Phyllis:** The general public is at fault for not doing something about it sooner. They have known of this problem for a long time and also knew that Landon is on probation.

**Jimmy:** The school board is to blame for not supplying the school for everything it needs.

**Dale:** The people in general are to blame. A lot of people say that it is the school board. If they really thought so, they could vote them out of office.

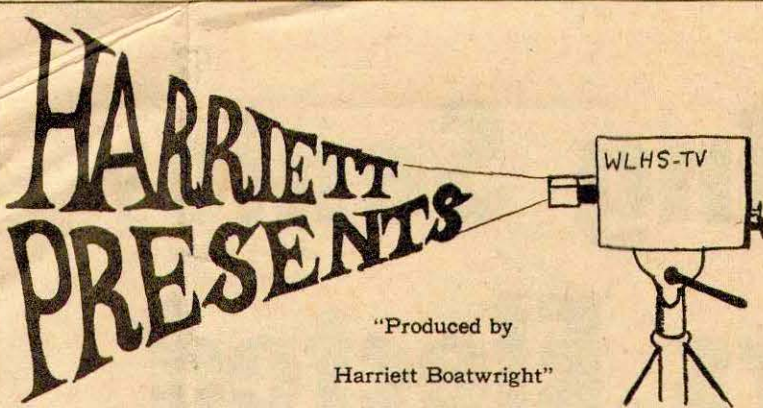
**Allen:** It is the fault of the administration at Landon for not raising the standards of the science department.

There are some lucky students who have time to watch T.V. and still get their homework done. Wayne Webb is one of these people. He never misses Popeye Playhouse!!

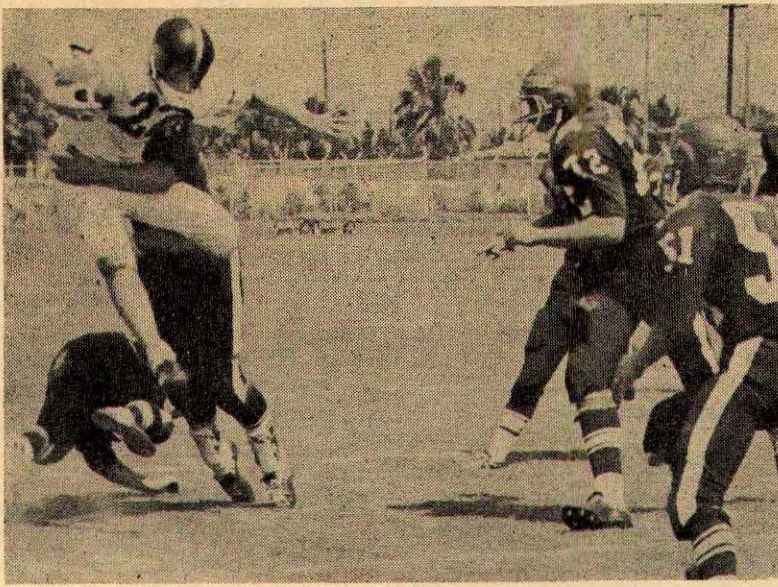
If anyone needs any experience in wrapping things, just consult Mike K., Mike O. N., Marli A., or Janice C. I saw their job and I must admit it was different!!

## Ribault Runs Over Landon

On Friday, September 25, at Ribault field the Lions met the Trojans of Ribault. It was the second outing for both teams. The Landon stands, full of supporters, the Cheerleaders, the players, and the coaches, were all hoping for Landon's first victory of the year. But everyone's hopes were crushed when Ribault dominated most of the game to come out on the top end of a score of 27-0.

As expected the Trojans compiled all of their yardage on the ground, for 272 yards. They attempted only three passes, all of which were incomplete. The Trojans ran inside, outside and all around the field. It was Cameron Davis who lead the attack with 104 yards, mostly around the ends, and Jimmy Brown next with 54 yards between the tackles. Ribault tallied up its first score at the end of a 52-yard march late in the first quarter. They scored one more time in the half, the culmination of a 73-yard drive and a touchdown in each of the remaining quarters.

The Lions chugged to 68 yards on the ground and 81 aerial yards for a 149 total yards. Two serious scoring threats were managed by the Lions, on at the end of the third quarter with quarterback Mike Burton struggling to two first downs on successive sets of plays only to be stopp'd at the 6 inch line in his last effort. The second try came in the closing minutes of the game, this time it was passing that kept the hope of scoring alive only to be repulsed again by a tough Trojan defense. The Lions were plagued by injuries, during the week preceding the game and also in the game itself. Mike Burton again did a superb job in the punting department with quite a few fine kicks to get us out of trouble. This loss brought the Lions record down to 0-2.

The play of both quarterbacks, Forbecker and Skip Murray looked good.

At one time, Forbecker hit a Landon receiver at the 15 but he wasn't able to hold on to the ball. On the third down he was dropped for a loss. With fourthdown and long yardage he completed a pass to Mitchell Bell who made a fine catch but fell short of a first down.

Finally in the fourth quarter Fletcher recovered a fumble and went on to score to put the game out of reach, 13-0.

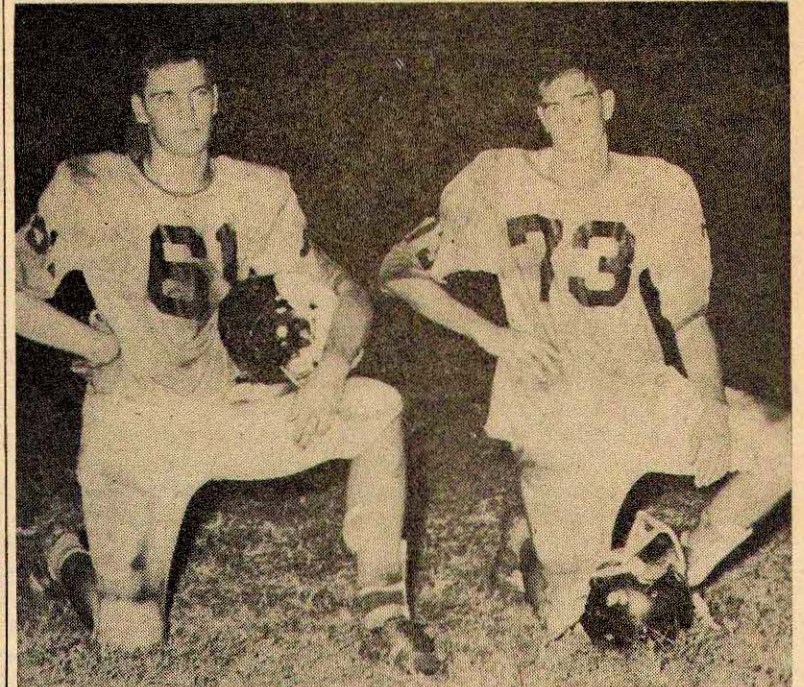

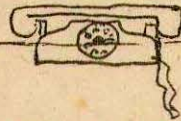
