As its name implies, the Pops Concert will be a light, enjoyable

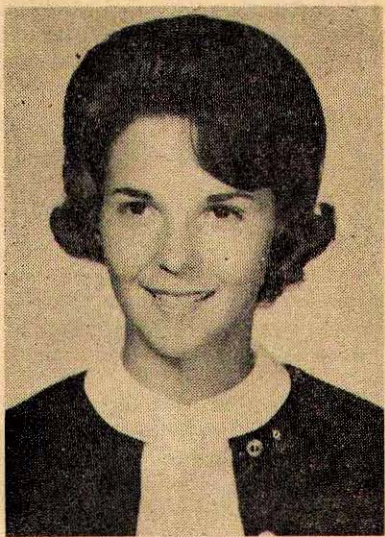

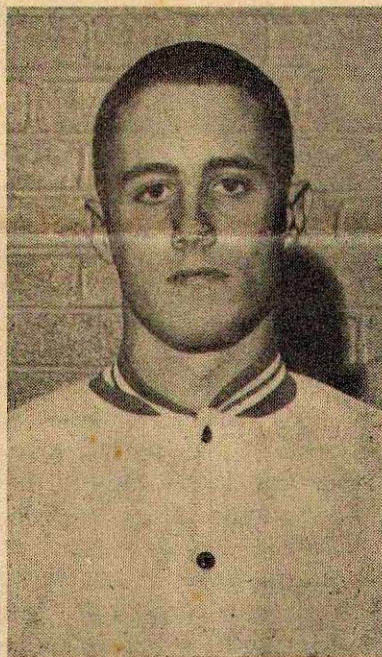

None saw the unceasing effort;

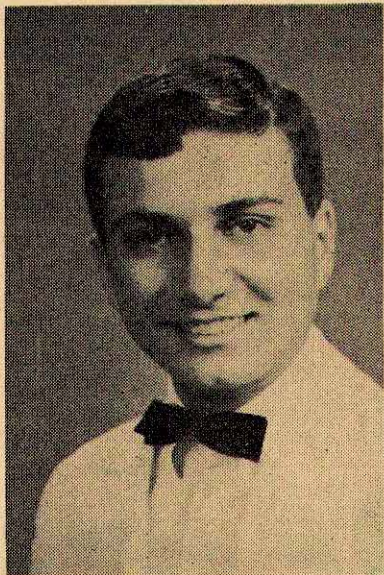
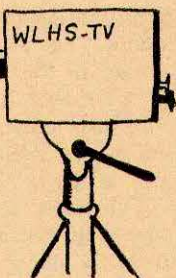

Lions Lacerate Palatka 105-61

Landon scored 100 points, something they hadn't done in three years, in beatin' Palatka on Tuesday, February 16 in the Landon gym.

The game began as a complete rout as the Lions scored 15 points in the first two minutes of play while holding Palatka to one point. For the rest of the quarter the Lions cooled down somewhat and slackened up a bit on defense. The score at the end of the first quarter was the fantastic sum of 38-6. The Lions employed a full-court press throughout the quarter which accounts for the low score of Palatka. The second quarter was not quite as much of a rout as the first but the Lions continued to score all over on Palatka's very ineffective zone defense. The Lions eased up their vicious defense and let Palatka score 14 to the Lions' 20, making the score at the half 58-20.

The third quarter was much the same as the second as the Lions allowed Palatka 14 more points while trying to tally up more points. Landon got 23 points in the quarter to make their total only 19 points short of 100. In the fourth quarter the hapless Palatka squad managed to outscore the Lions by taking advantage of many calls in their favor. Although plagued by foul trouble, the Lions still managed to get 24 points which put them 5 points over 100.

The Lions were lead by Mike O'Neal and Ronnie Ellison, who had 29 and 30 points respectively.

Lions Down Trojans

Landon beat Ribault on Saturday Night, February 13 by the score of 72-66. The Lions capitalized on the many fouls Ribault committed and made 40 points from the free throw line.

The Lions jumped off to an early lead and dominated the first few minutes of play but the Trojans managed to stage a weak rally to cut Landon's lead at the end of the first quarter to two points. Ribault's full court press in the second quarter failed to contain the Lions as they opened up on an 11 point lead by outscoring the Trojans 18-9.

The second half was exciting as Ribault came on strong to erase most of the Landon lead and Landon then came back to replenish it. The difference fluctuated from 9 to 3 points constantly. The end of the third quarter gave the Lions a 53-47 lead. In the fourth quarter neither team could gain on the other and both teams hit 19 to make the final score 72-66.

The Lions, who are third in the county, got revenge for the heart-breaking loss Ribault handed them earlier in the season. The winning margin for Landon was located in the foul department as they outscored Ribault 40-24, while the Trojans held a ten point edge from the floor. Richard McEvoy, the county's leading scorer, lead the Lions with 31 points. This victory moved Landon's record up to 16-6.



Landon Girls Are Volleyball Champs

On Saturday, February 6, the girls of Landon High School won the Duval County Senior High Volleyball Sports Day, held at Jacksonville University. Ten schools were represented with over 150 girls participating. The Landon girls won all ten of their games coming out with very high scores; definitely over powering their opponents.

The girls have worked hard to win the beautiful trophy they brought to Landon. They have been practicing for over two months; starting at 7:30 every morning, playing during sixth period and continuing on after school, and even playing Thursday nights and on Sunday afternoons.

Lions Down Kenny For Third Time

The Lions defeated the Bishop Kenny Crusaders for the third time this season despite a 24-point effort by Kenny's Richard Benet.

A 16-16 deadlock in the first quarter seemed to awaken the Lions as they outscored the Crusaders in the second round, 24-16, making the halftime score 40-31. Kenny gained another point in the third quarter by outscoring the Lions 16-15, and another in the last quarter, 26-25. But it was not enough to overcome the gap which the Lions had opened up in the second quarter and Landon ended up on the long end of an 80-73 score.

The Lions hit 57 percent from the floor to Kenny's 45 percent. Landon also led in rebounds, 32-19.

Once again Richard McEvoy was high man for the Lions with 19 points. Ronnie Ellison ran a close second with 18, and Mike O'Neal and Mike Burton tossed in 15 and 13 points respectively.

Landon Mutilates Bolles Bulldogs

The Lions came back after that heartbreaking loss to Fletcher to down a listless Bolles squad by the phenomenal score of 90-57.

Landon wasted no time showing who was boss in their second home game of the season by dominating all play in the first quarter to lead at its end by a 19-10 margin. The Bolles quint could do no better in the torrid second quarter as Landon increased its lead by 12 more points.

As the teams came onto the floor for the second half anticipation of a high score for Landon made the crowd tense even though the outcome of the game was never in doubt. The Lions came back strong in the third quarter and they had amassed 73 points by its completion. Now the chant "we want a hundred" was heard through the gym, but Bolles was not very obliging and did not allow the Lions a point for about two minutes of the last quarter. The Lions came back though to reach the ninety mark.

Landon shot 67% from the field (they only made 20% of their shots against Fletcher) and kept the ball away from Bolles with an effective full court press. O'Neal and Ellison led the Lions with 17 points apiece.

Landon Rallies Over Jackson

On Tuesday night, February 9, Landon defeated Jackson for the second time this season. The Lions dominated play in the fourth quarter to pull ahead from the Tigers.

Jackson rushed to an early lead in the opening period and the Lions spent the remainder of the period trying to erase their deficit. Jackson held possession of a 3 point lead, however, when the second quarter started. Landon rallied behind superb work under the boards and finally drove into the lead in the second quarter. The Lions went into the locker room with a slim 3 point lead after outscoring Jackson 16-10 in the second period.

Jackson again came back to regain the lead and then to fight the Lions tooth and nail for it. The lead changed hands incessantly until the Lions finally pulled away for good late in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter the Lions scored almost at will while putting a tight defense on Jackson to outscore them by 14 points. The final score was 77-58.

McEvoy lead the Lions in their victory with 20 points. Ronnie Ellison, who grabbed many rebounds, followed for the Lions with 16. Landon made a clean sweep of the twin-bill with the Junior Varsity romping over Jackson's J. V.

Jayvee Slaughters Palatka

The Landon Junior Varsity Basketball team finished out its season on February 16 by trampling Palatka's Jayvees 126-26.

The Lions outscored Palatka 20-5 in the first quarter. Landon kept right at it in the second quarter and pounded away 30 points while holding Palatka to 5 again. The Lions remained consistent in their defense in the third quarter, holding their opponents to 5 again while adding 35 more to their score. This made the score 85-15 at the end of the third quarter. The fourth quarter was the big one for the Lions — they scored 41 points, but in doing this Palatka was able to get 11.

The Jayvees employed an effective full court press throughout the game while taking advantage of Palatka's ineffective zone defense. The high scorers for Landon were David Patton and Buddy Macarages. Patton hit 33 and Macarages followed closely with 26. All of the rest of the players scored as follows: Ed Coker-16, Mike Smith-12, Doug Smith-10, Robert Padgett-10, Mitch Owens-6, Steve Cheatwood-6, and Glenn Cohen, who was injured early in the first quarter, 5.

This 100-point victory ended the season for the Jayvees Basketball team. The squad finished up with a 22-3 record under the direction of Coach Roey. A few of their many notable accomplishments this season were: scoring over a hundred points in one game twice, beating the Bishop Kenny Jayvee team twice — once at Kenny to win the Jayvee tournament there, and winning the county Jayvee Championship.
