## End of an Era Prom Cancelled

With the ending of the thirty-eight year history of Landon High School in June, another era will come to an end. This is the thirty-seven year era of the Landon Senior Class Play.

Yes, next Friday will close this era, for the thirty-seventh annual Senior Class Play will be presented by the last and greatest Landon graduating class, the Class of '65.

In 1928, Mrs. R. C. Lynch, now residing in Atlanta, directed the first class play. She sponsored the plays until 1938. From 1938-1941 Betty Dowling directed the class plays. Miss Elaine Parramore sponsored the plays until 1951, when Mrs. Dowling returned. From 1951-1954 Mrs. Dowling directed the class plays, and Mrs. E. Jane Porter, now a speech teacher at Forrest, sponsored the plays from 1955 to 1960. Since 1962 Mrs. Geri Turbow has advised the Senior Classes in their presentations.

Landon's final season of sports is closing out with an exceptionally good track team. Coach John Guido has high hopes for his talented charges and urges everyone to come out and support them. Here's an inside look at the team:

Running the mile this year are Tim Rometry, James Heath, and Peck Vinson. Rometry turns in a 5:03 on the mile.

In the 880 yd. event its George Copeland running it in 2:07. Close behind are John Graham, Don Cone, and Jack Minge with 2:09, 2:12, 2:12, respectively.

Dave Merrick excels in the 440 yd. dash, sprinting it in 42 seconds flat. Johnny Jones, Chuck Hyatt, and Steve Edenfield are also turning in fine performances in the 440.

The 220 yd. dash is burnt up quickly this year by Randy Lord and Kim McFeely.

Mike Burton stands out in the 100 yd. dash with an impressive 10.4. Mike is but four-tenths of a second away from tying the state record.

Ralph Kennedy has hit 16.9 on the 120 yd. high hurdle. The state record is 15 seconds.

Running the 180 yd. low hurdle are Mike Burton, Steve Edenfield, and Ralph Kennedy.

Coach Guido says that his 880 yd. relay is just fair at the moment, but in the sprint medley relay and the mile relay the boys are close to breaking the school record.

Turning to field events we find Mike Burton once again on top in the broad jump. Bobby Barry and Jon French are also fine leapers in this event.

Ronnie Ellison is the big man in the discus throw. Ron is nearing a school record with his best heave so far at 137 feet.


Throwing the shotput this year are Ellison again along with Jack Mizell.
